WINTER PROGRAMME 2026 – SEASONAL FLU AND COVID-19 VACCINATION

We are writing to provide further information on the 2026/27 winter seasonal vaccination programme, in addition to the information set out in the '[Seasonal Influenza \(Flu\) Immunisation Programme 2026/27: Confirmation Of Adult And Child Cohorts \(SGHD/CMO \(2026\) 05](#)' letter issued on 23 March 2026.

The spring and summer period has been an incredibly busy and challenging time for our Immunisation Teams, and we would like to thank you for your hard work in delivering this spring's COVID-19 programme, launching the double [expansion of the RSV older adult programme](#) and introducing the one off [meningococcal B \(MenB\) programme](#).

It remains essential that we continue to deliver vaccination programmes effectively to protect those most at risk, reduce pressures on primary and secondary care services, and prevent avoidable hospital admissions.

Key objectives for the winter 2026/27 programme

1. To protect those who are at higher risk of severe flu and COVID-19, to prevent severe illness, hospitalisation and death.
2. To minimise additional pressure on the NHS and social care services during the winter period as a result of flu and COVID-19 infection.
3. To increase uptake across the entirety of the programme, with a focus on those at highest risk, and those of pre-school age, for which high uptake is important for protecting wider society.
4. To achieve the World Health Organization goal of 75% population-level coverage in the 65+ age group.

Flu Vaccination Eligibility

6. Eligibility is almost identical to winter 2025/26, with the addition of cattle & swine workers for winter 2026/27.

Childhood Flu Programme Eligibility

- All children aged from 6 months to 18 years in clinical risk groups (if not eligible in accordance with bullets below)
- All children aged 2-5 years not yet at school (age as of 01/09/2026)
- All primary school children (primary one to primary seven)
- All secondary school pupils (S1 to S6)

Adult Flu Programme Eligibility

- Those living in long-stay residential care homes or other long-stay care facilities
- All those aged 65 years and over
- All those aged 18 to 65 years in defined risk groups. This includes:
 - those in clinical at-risk groups set out in [Influenza: the green book chapter - GOV.UK](#)
 - pregnant women
 - those experiencing homelessness
 - those experiencing substance misuse
 - asylum seekers living in Home Office hotel or B&B accommodation
 - all prisoners within the Scottish prison estate
- Frontline health and social care workers
- All NHS staff
- Poultry workers & bird handlers (see Annex A in the [2026/27 Flu CMO letter](#) for eligibility)
- Cattle & swine workers (see Annex B in the [2026/27 Flu CMO letter](#) for eligibility)
- Unpaid carers and young carers
- Household contacts of those with immunosuppression

COVID-19 Vaccination Eligibility

7. Eligibility for COVID-19 vaccination remains unchanged from winter 2025/26 and spring 2026. The following groups are being offered a COVID-19 vaccination in winter 2026/27. These individuals are also eligible for flu vaccination, which will be offered together at the same appointment:
 - Residents in care homes for older adults
 - All adults aged 75 years and over
 - Individuals aged 6 months and over who are immunosuppressed (as defined in tables 3 and 4 in the [COVID-19 chapter of the Green Book](#)).

8. Flu and COVID-19 vaccines will be offered to individuals in accordance with the recommendations in the [Influenza: the green book chapter - GOV.UK](#) and [COVID-19: the green book chapter - GOV.UK](#) and in line with related [Scottish Government Chief Medical Officer letters](#). Individuals who receive a letter, email or text message inviting them forward for vaccination will be considered eligible for vaccination without the need for further eligibility assessment.

Section 47 Certificate of Incapacity

9. If an individual is unable to give informed consent to vaccination, their carer should ensure that a valid Section 47 Certificate of Incapacity issued under the Adults with Incapacity (Scotland) Act 2000 is brought to the appointment. This certificate confirms that the assessing clinician has determined the individual lacks capacity and authorises treatment to be provided in their best interests. Vaccinators must see the certificate before proceeding and advising in advance of the appointment to bring certification will help avoid delays and ensure the appointment can go ahead smoothly. Health and social care workers (HSCWs)

10. Flu vaccination not only protects individual staff members but reduces the risk of transmission of flu viruses within health and social care settings, helping to protect both patients and colleagues. It is imperative that timely flu immunisation is encouraged for all frontline health and social care workers (HSCWs) in direct contact with patients/clients. In addition, non-frontline NHS staff remain eligible for the seasonal flu vaccine in 2026/27.
11. Staff vaccination remains a central element in our objective to protect the most vulnerable in our society and, as such:
- Health Boards are asked to make vaccination as easily accessible as possible for staff, including offering HSCW drop-in clinics and workplace vaccination.
 - HSCWs may also book their vaccination using the online portal or national vaccination helpline.
 - It is also possible for HSCWs to book an appointment at any venue across Scotland, not just their Health Board of residence, for example somewhere close to where they live, work or visit regularly.

Programme Age Limits

12. If an individual meets the age criteria on or before 31 March 2027 they will be eligible for vaccination. The only exceptions are for infants, where they must have turned 6 months on or before the programme starts on 1 September 2026 (born on or before 01 March 2026). For those pre-school children eligible for flu aged 2 years, they must have turned 2 years of age on or before the programme starts on 1 September 2026 (born on or before 1 September 2024).
13. **Residents in care homes for older adults:** There is no age restriction for this group. All residents in care homes for older adults are eligible.

14. **Those who are immunosuppressed:** Individuals who are immunosuppressed must be at least 6 months of age by 01 September 2026, therefore must have been born on or before 01 March 2026.

Programme timings

15. In keeping with JCVI flu advice, the timely delivery of vaccination is important to ensure the eligible population is protected before flu activity starts to increase in the winter months. The World Health Organization (WHO) has a goal of 75% population-level coverage in the 65+ age group. We expect the vast majority of the flu and COVID-19 adult programme to be completed by 6 December 2026, and boards should endeavour to meet that national WHO goal by that point. Those in the other eligible groups should also have the opportunity to come forward and receive flu and/or COVID-19 vaccination by that point. Below are the dates for the winter FVCV programme:
- **Early September:** Start of child flu programme and offer to pregnant women (*vaccine supply dependant*)
 - **As late as possible in September:** Flexibility to begin adult flu only cohorts.
 - **5 October:** Beginning of co-admin of COVID-19 and flu vaccines for those aged 18 years and over.
 - **6 December:** The aim is for all eligible adults to have had the opportunity to receive their seasonal flu and COVID-19 vaccinations by this point.
 - **Sunday 31 January 2027:** COVID-19 programme ends.
 - **Sunday 28 March 2027:** Flu programme ends.

The National Vaccination Helpline

16. Currently, the National Vaccination Helpline (0800 030 8013) only provides support to the flu and COVID-19 vaccination programmes. The helpline is unable to assist with or make bookings for any other vaccination programme.

Action

17. The benefits of vaccination should be clearly communicated and vaccination appointments made as easily accessible as possible, especially for those in historically less well served groups.
18. Health and Social Care Partnerships (HSCPs), GP practices, community pharmacies and others who are participating in the programme are asked to note and implement the arrangements outlined in this letter, noting that more detailed operational guidance will be made available from Public Health Scotland (PHS) to delivery teams closer to programme start.
19. We have procured sufficient vaccine to support uptake in eligible cohorts for the coming season, however ongoing effective management at a local level is essential to avoid unnecessary wastage.

Annex A: Vaccine products for Scotland's winter programme 2026

COVID-19

Vaccine dosage interval

The COVID-19 vaccine should usually be offered 6 months after the last vaccine dose, although operational flexibility around the timing of vaccination in relation to the last vaccine dose is considered appropriate (with a minimum interval of 3 months between doses). More information on operational flexibility can be found in the [COVID-19 chapter of the Green Book](#).

For the winter 2026 COVID-19 programme, the following COVID-19 vaccines are advised:

For individuals aged 18 years and over:

- Moderna mRNA Spikevax XFG
- Accord (HIPRA) BIMERVAX LP.8.1*

For children aged 12 to 17 years:

- Pfizer mRNA Comirnaty XFG (30 micrograms)
- Accord (HIPRA) BIMERVAX LP.8.1**

For children aged 6 months to 11 years:

- Pfizer mRNA Comirnaty XFG (10 micrograms)

* Accord (HIPRA) BIMERVAX LP.8.1 will be available for individuals aged 18 years and over in cases where mRNA products are considered not clinically suitable. It may also be employed in limited instances for small-scale local use for supply and logistic reasons.

** Accord (HIPRA) BIMERVAX LP.8.1 will be available for individuals aged 12-17 years in cases where mRNA products are considered not clinically suitable.
