Nuclear Medicine Breast Sentinel Lymph Node Injection



Your doctor has referred you for a Nuclear Medicine Sentinel Lymph Node Injection.

It is important that you read the enclosed booklet "Information about your Nuclear Medicine Test" with this leaflet.

What is a Sentinel Lymph Node Injection?

A Sentinel Lymph Node injection is a simple procedure that helps your Surgeon find your lymph nodes during surgery.

Do I need to do any special preparation before the Sentinel Lymph Node Injection?

There is no special preparation for this test. If you are to attend for surgery on the same day as your injection please follow the instructions for fasting you have been given. If you are not going for surgery on the same day you can eat and drink as normal.

What does a Sentinel Lymph Node Injection involve?

A Sentinel Lymph Node injection involves an injection of a small amount of radioactive liquid into your body near the site of your operation. This liquid drains into and follows the path of your lymphatic system. The liquid may then travel to nearby lymph nodes and helps the surgeon in theatre.

How long does the appointment last?

Your appointment will typically last up to 20 minutes

Pregnancy and Breastfeeding

Where possible we try to avoid performing Sentinel Lymph Node injections on patients who are, or may be pregnant. Therefore please contact the department if you are:

- Pregnant
- Breast-feeding
- You think you could be pregnant

If you are booking transport through the Scottish Ambulance Service please contact them as soon as possible and advise them you will be in the department for approximately 1 hour.
