

Gillian, Vik, Carol and Rachel have been working in partnership with the care homes and health and social care partnership (HSCP) teams to promote good nutritional care for residents. On visits to care homes they can be joined by the CHC care support workers (pictured left, Sharon and Stuart).

The team is passionate about the importance of nutrition and hydration and have developed tailored training and resources for use in care homes. The resources were highlighted as part of Nutrition and Hydration week in March. They are most proud of developing Project Milkshake which has supported residents to maintain their weight and reduce their risk of malnutrition.

Hello I'm Andy, and I'm thrilled to be a part of the Care Home Collaborative, Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) team. Previously I worked as a charge nurse at the Royal Alexandria Hospital and looked after older adults recovering from surgery. During this time I learned of the importance of preventing infection, and by doing so improving care.

This experience inspired me to take on this new role and contribute to enhancing IPC standards in both care homes and mental health wards across Greater Glasgow and Clyde. I have been involved in the development of IPC education for care home staff, and look forward to undertaking my specialist IPC qualification later this year.

New Resources - IPC Toolkits

Standard Infection Control Precautions (SICPs) are the basic infection prevention and control (IPC) measures which reduce the risk of transmitting infection, whether or not there is known infection. SICPs are part of everyday practice and should be used by all care home staff, at all times, for all residents, to support the safety of the whole home.

The IPC Team has developed interactive IPC kits based on 4 of the 10 SICPs.

- · Hand Hygiene
- · Personal protective equipment (PPE)
- · Cleaning of reusable equipment
- Management of Linen

Designed to be delivered in small groups to facilitate discussion, each kit takes about 20 minutes to complete, and adds to the existing IPC knowledge of care home staff. The kits contain video resources, information from the Care Home Infection Prevention and Control Manual (CH IPCM), and also have a practical element to try, such as a glow box for hand hygiene.
