Contrast Enhanced CT-PET-CT Department

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This leaflet must be read alongside the leaflet: Information for patients receiving a PET-CT Scan.

What is a CT scan?

A CT (Computed Tomography) scan takes a series of pictures of your body using X-rays. The pictures show cross-sections or slices of your body. This gives a very detailed image of the inside of your body.

A contrast (dye) injection before your scan helps to show your organs and vessels more clearly.

Do I need to do any special preparation before my CT scan?

You **must** follow the preparation instructions given in the leaflet-**Information for patients receiving a PET-CT Scan**.

We also recommend you drink at least 500mls of still water before your appointment.

What does the scan involve?

Your doctor has requested a PET-CT scan **and** a CT scan with contrast. These will be done on the same day.

When your PET-CT scan is finished, you will remain on the scanning bed. A contrast injection will be given to you and a CT scan will be performed.

How long will it take?

The CT scan only takes about 10 minutes. However, staff will ask you to wait in the department for 15 minutes after your contrast injection.

What are the risks?

The CT scan exposes you to a small amount of radiation in addition to your PET-CT scan. The risks associated with this are low and considered to be outweighed by the diagnostic benefits of the scan.
