TOPIC OF THE MONTH: TAKING SCOTTISH INNOVATION GLOBAL - COPS AT SIO BOSTON 2025


Last month, COPS had the privilege of presenting our audit findings on an international stage at the SIO Conference in Boston, USA. This was a significant moment for our team and for NHS Greater Glasgow & Clyde, as we showcased how Scotland is leading the way in delivering frailty-informed, person-centred cancer care for older adults. Thank you to the Beatson WoS Cancer Centre, Macmillan Cancer Charity and the Beatson Cancer Charity for supporting our journey!

Our poster highlighted how integrating geriatrician, nursing and occupational therapy expertise within oncology pathways improves outcomes such as treatment adherence, functional ability, independence at home and overall quality of life. Delegates were particularly interested in how COPS blends holistic assessment with practical intervention – from cognitive screening and medication review to fatigue management, ADL support and community linkage. Many international colleagues commented that Scotland is ahead of the curve in embedding frailty support directly into cancer pathways, rather than treating it as an optional add-on.

The conference offered an invaluable opportunity to learn from global experts, compare approaches and reflect on the universal challenges of supporting older adults with complex needs through cancer treatment. What stood out most was how aligned our COPS model is with worldwide priorities: safe treatment planning, shared decision-making, improved function, and helping people remain at home for as long as possible. Being invited to present internationally reinforces that the work happening here at the Beatson is innovative, evidence-based and worthy of global recognition. As we continue to strengthen and develop the COPS model, this international interest offers momentum, validation and a reminder of the positive impact we can make for patients across the West of Scotland.

CANCER OLDER PEOPLES SERVICE

Comprehensive Geriatric Assessment: Enhancing Cancer Care through MDT Collaboration



The G8 screening tool helps identify older cancer patients who may benefit from a CGA. At COPS, CGAs are holistic and include review of frailty, physical function, mobility, cognition, mental health, polypharmacy, and social factors. This helps us develop a personalised care plan based on what matters most to the patient, with regular reviews to ensure each aspect of care is followed through.

CGA AND ONCOLOGY - DOES IT HELP?

Evidence suggests that following a CGA:

- 1. Patient Outcomes are improved.
- 2. Patients are more likely to complete treatment and experience less severe toxicities.

3. The patient and team **produce problem lists** and

develop goal-driven interventions to tackle these
