Updated Guidance for Health and Social Care Staff - managing symptoms

Please see <u>attached updated guidance</u> for health and social care staff following changes to population wide testing and restrictions. This guidance applies to the following service user face to face roles:

- Staff who work with patients and services users in a face to face setting
- Members of staff who are regularly in social care setting (for example, a care home or adults day care centre)
- Domestic, catering and support staff but does not include office based staff members who do not enter these settings.

Overall the guidance sets out arrangements in relation to:

- Routine asymptomatic testing
- Staff members with symptoms of a respiratory infection including COVID-19
- Staff members who receive a positive LFD test result for COVID-19
- Staff members who are contacts of a confirmed case of COVID-19.

Health and social care staff members who do not work in face to face settings with patients and service users should follow the Government's <u>Stay at Home</u> guidance for the general population, if respiratory symptoms occur and inform their line manager.

Reminder – inpatient visiting arrangements

As noted in <u>Core Brief last week</u> changes to inpatient visiting were introduced from 8am Saturday 30 April. The changes mean that the majority of inpatients across NHSGGC hospitals are again able to benefit from the support of at least one visitor at a time.

New visiting arrangements are as follows:

One visitor at a time; the visitor can change daily

- Glasgow Royal Infirmary
- Stobhill Ambulatory Care Hospital
- Royal Alexandra Hospital
- Lightburn Hospital
- Vale of Leven Hospital

• Inverclyde Royal Hospital

Up to two visitors at a time; the visitors can change daily

- Queen Elizabeth University Hospital
- Gartnavel General Hospital
- New Victoria Hospital
- Beatson West of Scotland Cancer Centre
- Royal Hospital for Children
- All Regional wards
- All mental health wards
- All maternity wards

While family members or friends may be able to visit two at any one time, in some hospitals, due to the ward environment, people may be asked to visit separately.

Face coverings/face masks reminder

All staff are reminded that despite the relaxation on mask wearing in the community, they should adhere to the following guidance:

All staff who work in clinical buildings e.g. hospitals, health centres, must wear a FRSM, upon entering the building and should continue to wear one throughout their shift, except in a limited number of circumstances e.g. when maintaining two metre physical distance in a non-clinical environment when eating and drinking or when working in an office outwith the clinical environment.

Staff who work solely in non-clinical buildings - such as Board headquarters, Caledonia House or other standalone offices – and who do not enter buildings where patient care is provided, do not need to wear FRSMs, but instead should wear their own face covering when not seated at their desk and when walking about the office.

Staff members who work in non-clinical buildings but as part of their job role will enter a building where patient care is provided must change to a FRSM.
