I would like to remind staff that this year's iMatter survey will start to be rolled out to the first cohort of NHSGGC staff on Monday. I would like to encourage all staff, when the time comes for you to complete the survey, to please do so. It is imperative that we hear your views so that we can continue to further improve the way we work together. The first cohort includes; Acute SMT, Human Resources & Organisational Development, Corporate Communications and Public Engagement, Chief Executives Office, Public Health, Specialist Children's Services, Oral Health, East Dunbartonshire HSCP and the Payroll Services team within our Finance Directorate. One issue staff have raised as part of our previous iMatter survey and through other feedback mechanisms, including Investors in People was the need for face to face engagement with managers and senior leaders within the organisation. This was primarily so that you could receive regular and consistent information about organisational performance, the core objectives of your directorate and team, as well as the opportunity to discuss issues affecting where you work. In order to ensure we can deliver on this important engagement requirement, our Communications and Staff Engagement teams have been working with staff across NHSGGC to refresh and reintroduce an organisation-wide Team Brief, which will be shared with staff each month. From May, we are undertaking a pilot within the Corporate Nursing team, the South Sector and East Dunbartonshire HSCP, so we can test the information cascade process, the types of material included and the ability for staff to use the sessions as a discussion opportunity within their respective teams. For staff who are involved in the pilot, the Communications team would like to receive your feedback, so we can shape this way of communicating with staff very much in mind.
