# Whooping cough (pertussis) vaccine for NHSGGC staff working with infants and pregnant women

Scotland is currently experiencing a rapid rise in cases of whooping cough, with more than we would normally expect.

Whooping cough is a highly contagious bacterial infection of the lungs and airways. It causes repeated coughing bouts that can last for two to three months or more. It can make babies and young children very ill, including causing serious breathing issues, leading to pneumonia and hospitalisation. In rare cases whooping cough can be fatal. Newborn babies are at the most risk of serious illness if they catch the virus but cannot be vaccinated until they are eight weeks.

If you're in one of the following NHSGGC staff groups, you are urged to get your whooping cough (pertussis) vaccination at our drop-in sites in the coming weeks. This is to protect you and to avoid transmission to patients. No booking is necessary.

## Priority vaccination groups:

1. Healthcare workers with regular/close clinical contact with severely ill infants (under 3 months old) and women in last month of pregnancy, including maternity, obstetrics, neonatal and paediatric intensive care

- 2. Healthcare workers with regular clinical contact with young unimmunised infants in hospital or community settings, such as other paediatric services and health visitors
- 3. Healthcare workers with intermittent clinical contact with young unimmunised infants in the community, including general practice.

Please note questions will be asked by immunisation nurses to ensure you meet criteria prior to receiving the vaccine. Clinics will be at acute sites and community-based settings. Staff can attend any clinic regardless of their work-base location. Dates and locations will be shared in Core Brief and Staffnet.

The measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccination will also be available at the clinics to staff who have no history of MMR vaccination or are unsure regarding their vaccination status.

It is anticipated that uptake for vaccination will be high, and we ask you to understand that some clinics may be busier than others throughout the sessions. If for any reason you are not able to access the vaccination at a scheduled drop in clinic, please contact the Occupational Health Service to arrange an appointment at the WGACH Hub by emailing <u>occupational.health@ggc.scot.nhs.uk</u>

#### Launch of new app to help meet the needs of autistic patients

A new app <u>GGC - Meeting the needs of Autistic People</u> is now live on the Right Decision Service.

This mobile app, which is also available via the Right Decision website, is to ensure that information on how to meet the needs of autistic / neuro-divergent people coming into our service is available for staff to access quickly and easily.

The guidance provided in the app is for any member of staff involved in the treatment and care of an autistic patient. Using this guidance will help ensure that autistic people are enabled to access services and undergo treatments in a manner which fully addresses their needs.

The app includes positive changes that can be put in place throughout the patient journey. It also provides information on how to address autistic meltdowns/ shutdowns and explains the core autistic needs that should be considered when providing accessible clinical environments.
