Health and Care (Staffing) (Scotland) Act 2019 (HCSSA)

The Health and Care (Staffing) (Scotland) Act 2019 - (HCSSA) seeks to enable safe high-quality care and improved outcomes for service users by ensuring appropriate and effective levels of staffing for NHS Scotland and care service providers. The legislation was enacted on 1 April 2024 and applies across healthcare and care services.

New HCSSA resources

To support colleagues to understand what the Act means in practise across NHSGGC, newly developed resources are available. These include a Common Staffing Method SOP, Nursing and Midwifery's 'Safe to Start' In-Patient Hospital Services Process with a short video presentation, and Anaesthetics and Critical Care Time to Lead SOP Case Study Poster and very brief video. NHSGGC's Regional Services staff praised at annual awards

Four winners were named at the annual Regional Services awards, including a Senior Charge Nurse at the Beatson cancer centre, and staff working in challenging conditions in a mental health secure care ward.

In total there were 35 nominations - double that of last year - coming from every area of Regional Services including cancer care, plastics, forensic mental health and neurology.

Lorna Welsh, an Advanced Clinical Nurse Specialist working in Haematology at the Queen Elizabeth University Hospital, was named Employee of the Year.

This year's Innovation prize went to staff at the Institute for Neurological Sciences who have been using a pioneering mixed reality (MR) system that allows them to "see inside" a patient's body during surgery.

Meanwhile, Elder Ward nursing team at Rowanbank Clinic were praised for the care shown to patients in challenging circumstances as they were awarded Team of the Year.

The Leader of the Year prize went to Lynsey Watt, Senior Charge Nurse in the Beatson's B1 ward for Gynaecology and skin cancer patients.

An overall winner for the Regional Services category will be announced at NHSGGC's Celebrating Success Awards in May.

Regional Service staff awards

Holyrood Connect Digital Health and Care Awards

NHSGGC teams were recognised at the annual Holyrood Connect Digital Health and Care Awards this week.

These awards focus on digital innovation within Scotland's health, social care and third-sector services.

NHSGGC's Cancer Pathway Management Solution – Patient Pathway Plus (PP+) won the Industry Collaboration Award category and Fracture Liaison Service (FLS) won the Digital Service Transformation category.

NHSGGC eHealth and Cancer Tracking teams, working with supplier Insource, have co-developed and adopted Patient Pathway Plus to unlock cancer data insights from multiple sources. Up to date joined and contextualised information is presented, allowing Cancer Trackers and frontline service staff to focus their attention and efforts on the patients with the most urgent need.

The Fracture Liaison Service application has been developed in partnership with eHealth, West of Scotland Innovation Hub, clinical teams and supplier Redstar.

It addresses a key challenge in osteoporosis and fragility fracture care. As the population ages, the impact of osteoporosis-related fractures is growing.

Despite available treatments, 50% of women over 50 do not receive optimal post-fracture care. The FLS application proactively identifies individuals who have experienced a fragility fracture and are at ongoing risk of further fractures.

Identified patients then have tailored care provided for their ongoing treatment via multidisciplinary teams.
