Get your flu jag in three easy steps:

Public Protection Service adult referral form

The Adult Support and Protection Guidance provides information on how to complete an Adult Protection 1 (AP1) form on Clinical Portal. To further support staff the Public Protection Service (PPS) have developed a very short video which demonstrates where staff can find the form, highlights the key fields which require completion and how to make contact with the Social Work Department.

If you do not have access to Clinical Portal and are completing a paper copy of the form it is essential that all parts of the form are completed. There are a high number of forms which are returned that state 'other' in the category of abuse and location of referrer. This information is required to provide accurate and robust governance reports and enables the PPS to analyse trends and patterns of referrals.

When completing a paper AP1 form it is essential to include:

- **The most appropriate category of abuse**

- **Your precise location on the form.**

The Teenage and Young Adult (TYA) Cancer Education Day takes place on Thursday 12 November 2026, from 10.00am to 4.00pm at the V&A Museum Dundee, with the option to join online.

This educational event will bring together professionals from across Scotland to explore key challenges and considerations in supporting teenagers and young adults affected by cancer.

Topics will include:

- Challenges and barriers within TYA referral pathways across Scotland
- Navigating roles, responsibilities and professional boundaries
- Fertility considerations and the potential impact of cancer treatment on young people
- Sexual health and wellbeing in relation to TYA cancer
- Non-compliance, treatment refusal and ethical decision-making.

The event provides an excellent opportunity to share experiences, discuss challenges, learn from colleagues and experts, and enhance our understanding of the unique needs of young people living with and beyond cancer.
