New Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Chief Officer Appointed

Billy McClean has been appointed as the new Chief Officer of Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership.

Billy was appointed following a robust recruitment and selection process carried out jointly by Renfrewshire Council and NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde.

Billy brings with him a wealth of experience from his extensive career in health and social care. He is currently Head of Community Health and Care Services at South Ayrshire HSCP and NHS Ayrshire and Arran, where he has held leadership responsibility for the design and delivery of



adult services. This includes managing a workforce of over 1,000 staff, a wide range of commissioned services, and overseeing a budget exceeding £100 million.

Billy will take up his new role in coming months. The appointment will be formally ratified at the local IJB meeting in June.
