

## Message from Jane Grant, Chief Executive (15 June 2021, 10.55am)

I was delighted to see that John Stuart and Dr Kerri Neylon were recognised in the Queen's Birthday Honours this year. John, who recently retired form his role as Chief Nurse in the North sector, was awarded an MBE for his contribution to NHSGGC and Kerri has been awarded an OBE for her contribution to Health and Social Care, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic. I am extremely pleased for both of them as they are both very deserving of this recognition.

Last week marked six months since we administered our very first COVID vaccination, with nurse Paula McMahon being the first person in NHSGGC to roll up her sleeve. Alongside the pledge, we are proud to support the launch of the NHS Scotland Pride Badge. The purpose of the badge is to identify allies of the LGBT+ and minority ethnic communities, meaning that wearers of the badges are people who members of the community feel comfortable talking to, or approaching for support. I would encourage anyone who is keen to be involved, to please sign-up and show support to your LGBT+ and minority ethnic colleagues.
