NHSGGC Flying Start Support Sessions – November 2021

Flying Start NHS[®] is the national development programme that the Scottish Government and NHSGGC requires all registered nurses, midwives and allied health professionals (AHPs) to complete, in their first year in practice. Each newly qualified practitioner (NQP) within NHSGGC, should be afforded 24 hours protected learning time away from the workplace to support completion of the Flying Start NHS[®] programme within their first year.

To support all NQPs, whether you are just commencing the programme, are working towards or nearing completion of this, the Practice Education team will be hosting Flying Start Support Sessions on MS Teams. These sessions provide peer support and discussion and highlight relevant information, which you will find helpful to clarify Flying Start NHS[®] programme requirements.

Boys saved by medics return to RHC for fundraising celebration

A young family has been back to the Royal Hospital for Children to thank them for their 'incredible' care, after their two children fell dangerously ill with e-coli and needed dialysis and a kidney transplant.

Anthony and Louise McFaulds were living in Elgin last year when their



two boys Sam (now 5) and Leo (now 9) became dangerously ill with the infection which led to HUS, a rare complication which affects the kidneys. After a few days it became clear that they both needed to be transferred to the Royal Hospital for Children in Glasgow for specialist treatment.

Louise said: "We are so grateful to the Royal Hospital for Children and the amazing staff for everything they did for our boys. Without them, they wouldn't be here today.

"After a period of dialysis, Sam recovered but it soon became clear that Leo would need ongoing dialysis and ideally a transplant."

The successful transplant took place in the RHC in February 2021 and the whole experience led the family to make some dramatic decisions and move back down from Elgin to be closer to the hospital.

As well as meeting their doctor Ben Reynolds, the family were able to cheer on Tom Goodwin, who is walking from Land's End to John O'Groats for Kidney Research UK.

Tom was born with four kidneys and had to undergo a life-saving operation aged just ten months. Thirty two years on he is fit and healthy and walking 1,000 miles to raise money for the charity and above all, raise awareness of kidney disease, which affects one in seven people in Scotland.

Dr Ben Reynolds, a paediatric nephrologist, was also there to meet Tom.

Dr Reynolds said: "It was great to meet Tom and see Leo and Sam running about and doing so well. They have come a long way."
