





NHSGGC BME Staff Network celebrated South Asian Heritage Month on the evening of 17<sup>th</sup> August 2023.



This was an evening of South Asian food, music and stories from colleagues with South Asian Heritage about their experience of living in Glasgow and working in the Health Services.















Our first speaker was **Dr Saqib Razzaq, Project Officer and head of research for Colourful Heritage**, a project aimed at capturing and recording the life stories of the earlier generation of migrants from South Asia and the largest online archive of early South Asian and Muslim migrants to Scotland.

We heard from Saqib about the history of South Asians in Scotland and about plans for a war meme Irish for soldiers from the British Indian Army who fought in the world wars.

We then heard an inspiring talk from Araf Saddiq Scotland's first South Asian Paramedic and recipient of the Queen's Ambulance Service Medal. Araf spoke about his childhood growing up in Bridgeton and what motivated him to become a paramedic in the Scottish Ambulance service.

Finally, we heard from **Dr Shubh Gupta.** Shubh was born and raised in Kolkata. Graduated in MBBS from Burdwan Medical College and Hospital. Worked at Ruby General Hospital for approx. 5 years.

Thereafter he came to the UK for further post graduate training in April 2004. Shubh spoke about his leadership journey as an IMG from his first job in the UK as a novice anaesthetic SHO in Cardiff in 2004, gaining a training number in the West of Scotland in 2007, being appointed Consultant at the Western Infirmary in 2013 to being appointed Lead Clinician in Anaesthetics for 3 years and thereafter appointed Clinical Director in Anaesthesia, NHSGGC South Sector in 2021.
